CONGRATULATIONS TO OUR 2011 WINNERS

On April 9, the United Nations Association of Northern Colorado presented the 2011 International Humanitarian Award to the Murulle Foundation and the Dille/Dunbar Fund, in recognition of their international service connecting northern Colorado with sustainable development efforts in Ethiopia and in Angola.

Each year UNA-NOCO recognizes the work of local citizens who are helping achieve the UN Millennium Development Goals. This year we were privileged to highlight not just one, but two organizations, actively working to end poverty and hunger, to establish gender equality, and to foster environmental sustainability in different regions of Africa.

The Murulle Foundation's work in Ethiopia's southern highlands has become a highly respected model for humanitarian assistance worldwide. Founders Paul Evangelista, Jason Roussos, and Paul Swartzinki--all graduates of CSU College of Natural Resources-describe Murulle's mission as building an "enduring coexistence of people and threatened ecosystems in sub-Saharan Africa."

According to Murulle project coordinator, Karel Waltermire, "Helping people directly is important. Of equal importance is conserving the land on which their livelihoods— indeed, their very lives — depend."

Murulle projects—the Women's Small Business Loan Project, the Mountain Nyala Project and others—combine micro-enterprises for sustainable livelihoods with scientific initiatives that conserve the land and water resources of Ethiopia's ecosystem and watersheds.

In similar fashion, the Dille/Dunbar Fund meets a critical need to ease the way for women in Angola returning to farms, villages and cities after decades of civil strife.

The specific focus is "training women in life skills and economic self-sufficiency," notes Paula Dille, a member of the family group who established the fund to honor the legacy of parents and grandparents. "War torn areas of the central highlands were 70 percent women, many of whom needed education and a way to feed their families . . ."

Since its establishment, Dille/Dunbar Fund has built five schools providing literacy, health, sewing, agriculture, human rights and micro-enterprise skills. The schools have enrollments of 50 to 200 young women per six-month session, and have earned the recognition of the Angolan government, which now provides support by paying the teachers.

The formal Award presentation along with a lively presentation about the ongoing work of Murulle and Dille/Dunbar, were held on Saturday, April 9 at the Harmony Library of Fort Collins, followed by refreshments generously provided by Eleanor Dwight and Mary Wolfe.

Congratulations to both organizations. The United Nations Association of Northern Colorado is proud to honor your decades of service connecting the people of northern Colorado to the wellbeing of citizens on the African continent.

INTERNATIONAL WORLD WATER DAY AT CSU

Bravo To Our Newest (And Youngest?) UNA NCO Member, Phoenix Mourning Star.

Phoenix managed a very successful World Water Day on March 22 at CSU. He, along with the help of his 'team,' set up booths and activities and workshops on ground water, water quality etc. Phoenix even managed to snag Dr. Douglas Walker, a water expert from the U.S. State Department to come out from Washington to talk about work in the State Department. Walker is a Desk Officer for the Offices of Afghanistan and Pakistan in the Bureau of South and Central Asia.

International World Water Day is held annually on March 22 to highlight the importance of freshwater and advocating for the sustainable management of freshwater resources.

Those who attended Dr. Walker's talk learned a lot about how things are done behind the scenes at the State Dept. I gained a great respect for the thoroughness and science behind the ongoing work there. For instance, when the terrible floods hit Pakistan last year, it was Dr. Walker's job to put together a team of water experts to help the Pakistanis evaluate the situation and make suggestions for coping.

Dr. Walker noted that when they go to work in a country they are careful to ask what those in country want and need and not to impose our solutions upon them. From time to time, he is also asked to support higher-level State Dept. officials as they testify before Congress or another body with all the technical, logistical, and geographic information that the official might need. He must have all this information in his head as there is not time to "Google" it!

Dr. Walker attended CSU in the 80s, earning his bachelor's in watershed science, his master's in civil engineering and his doctoral degree in agricultural engineering. How does a water expert get to the State Dept.? The American Academy for the Advancement of Science contracts with the State Department to provide experts in various fields of science and scholars compete for the appointments.

After seeing and hearing Dr. Walker, I came away feeling that we are in good hands if he is an example of those working at State.

WICOSANI COMMUNITY PROJECT

The Wicosani Community Project is a collaborative effort with the women of the community of Wounded Knee in the Pine Ridge area of the Lakota Territory in South Dakota. "Wicosani" means to walk in balance with the four aspects of Self: physical, mental, emotional, and Spiritual. We found separately and together, that our vision for restoring Wicosani to the community must first be restored to individual families.

The heart of the project is to assist women and families reclaim their family land as the first step in rebuilding their lives. Once this is established the next step is helping to build an earthen architecture *eco-dome*, designed by *Nader Khalili* and modified as needed. The soul of the project is to create hope and self-assurance for women raising children alone, many of whom have left abusive relationships. They want to move back to their land so they can improve the quality of life for their children and/or grandchildren. We offer them our hand and the tools to rebuild their lives for themselves, and those of the next seven generations.

After collaborative effort in prioritizing the needs of these families it was decided that:

- Tiyospaye Winyan Maka (TWM) will partner with Village Earth to guide the women in reclaiming the family land base.
- Cal-Earth and TWM will work with families to modify blueprints of the eco-dome housing project to best reflect the needs of the family.
- "Skill set" workshops for youth will be developed to foster cottage industry with various groups, such as Engineers without Borders, Woodbine Ecological Center, Oglala Lakota College, Trees, Water, People, and Filters for Families.

The Lakota Circle Village, an Immersion School for Lakota children, was invited to participate in late afternoon or early evening for sessions of storytelling or talking circles to promote interaction between elders and youth in the Lakota language and to help

re-establish cultural values across the generations.

Incorporated into the design of the eco-dome will be a rainwater harvesting system, which will be coupled with purification а alarming svstem. given the statistics water borne on (due nuclear illnesses to



radiation from abandoned uranium mines) of the South Dakota reservation waters. Purified water can be used for cooking and drinking and the gray water can be recycled and used for gardening and indigenous permaculture.

Finally, wind turbines and solar panels will be provided in a workshop format that will teach the assembly, installation, and maintenance of these systems. By learning how to assemble and maintain the turbine and solar panels, a technician will rarely need to be called.

The specific reasons behind the *sweat equity* style of building, as well as the *workshop* format delivered to the future homeowners are to:

- Increase self-sufficiency; self-esteem
- Promote project ownership in the family
- Create cottage industry
- Promote and enhance native language between elders and youth
- Help to preserve cultural values of the Lakota
- Create a healthier home and outdoor environment

The *Wicosani* Community Project utilizes local, national, and international volunteers. We know that the entire concept will be shared with many different regions of various reservations.

We are now preparing for our 2011 building season. Our plan is to build 3 double eco-domes in three different communities. We need another \$30,000 for supplies and materials. Funding is difficult to obtain for new, unproven projects. However, a fund-raising benefit concert and silent auction was held on 7 May at Avogadro's Number in Fort Collins.

Denver Zoo conservation project recognized by

UNDP—Earlier this year, the UN Development Program (UNDP) designated conservation work done by the Denver Zoo and the Mongolian Academy Sciences in Mongolia's Ikh Nart Nature Reserve as a "model program." It will be used as an example to replicate and adapt to other parks and reserves. more information, see http://www.denverzoo.org/.



Libya: UN food aid arriving via newly-opened humanitarian corridor—The UN World Food Program (WFP) has started moving food aid through a new humanitarian corridor into western Libya to reach areas heavily affected by the fighting.

On 18 April, the first convoy of eight trucks loaded with 240 tons of wheat flour and 9.1 tons of high-energy biscuits--enough to feed nearly 50,000 people for a month--crossed into western Libya from Ras Jedir on the Libyan-Tunisian border. The supplies will be delivered through WFP's partner the Libyan Red Crescent. The WFP has been getting food and other relief supplies to other parts of Libya using a variety of different corridors. So far, they have reached more than 187,000 people in eastern Libya and have pre-positioned more than 17,500 metric tons of food stocks inside the country and across the region.

DPR Korea: UN agencies begin emergency operations to feed 3.5 million people—29 April 2011. The UN World Food Program (WFP) and the UN Children's Fund (UNICEF) announced plans to introduce emergency operations in the Democratic People's Republic of Korea (DPRK) to feed an estimated 3.5 million people in desperate need after crop losses and a particularly bitter winter.

Swedish 'lottery of life' campaign wins UN award for public service advertising—5 May. An interactive campaign from Sweden is this year's winner of the UN award to honor advertising that promotes the ideals and goals of the world body. The ad campaign has been so successful in Sweden-more than 250,000 hits on its website--that it is being expanded to other countries and languages.

The "Lottery of Life" is an integrated campaign,

including a website featuring a lottery wheel where Swedes-less than 1% of the world's population—could take a virtual spin and learn what their life would be like and what problems they would face if they had been born in another country.



Lowe Brindfors, the ad agency, explained, "Many of the campaigns are quite the same: it's all horrible pictures of starvation and death. We thought that this way we are making people care about this issue in a very different way. Being born in Sweden, a rich country, is a privilege to only 0.08 per cent of the world, a striking figure since being born to a life in poverty, wars etc. is somewhere over 70 per cent."

UN rolls out innovative water carriers to help residents of arid Darfur region—26 April. The residents of eight villages in Darfur will be among the

first in the arid Sudanese region to have easier access to water under an initiative backed by the joint African Union/UN Hybrid Operation in Darfur (UNAMID).



The mission will distribute several thousand high-capacity barrel-shaped water containers--each capable of carrying 75 liters of water--over the next two weeks. The containers, manufactured by the Hippo Water Roller Project from South Africa, are designed to relieve most of the physical burden of carrying water and to reduce the number of trips a resident will have to make to a water source.

Pesticide placed on UN list of hazardous chemicals to be eliminated—3 May 2011. Endosulfan, an insecticide widely used in agriculture for pest control has become the latest hazardous chemical to be added to the United Nations' list of persistent organic pollutants (POPs) targeted for elimination from the global market by next year, the UN Environment Program (UNEP) announced today.

Representatives from 127 governments meeting in Geneva from 25 to 29 April agreed to add endosulfan, an organochlorine insecticide, to the POPs list because it is known to cause reproductive and developmental damage in both animals and humans. The chemical is mainly used as a pest control agent in cotton, coffee and tea farms worldwide.

The conference evaluated the continued need for DDT for disease vector control to combat mosquitoes, the vector of the deadly malaria parasite. Delegates saw a continued need to use DDT while effective alternatives are being sought and implemented by an increasing number of countries.

International day for landmine awareness—4 April.

Clean development projects under UN climate change pact top 3,000—5 May. The Clean Development Mechanism (CDM), an international arrangement that channels investment into clean energy and greenhouse gas reduction technology in developing countries has registered its 3,000th project. The 3,000th project under CDM is a wind power project in Inner Mongolia, China. The mechanism is part of the Kyoto Protocol, an addition to the Convention that contains legally binding measures to reduce greenhouse gas emissions.

UN panel pays out \$880 million in reparations for Iraq's invasion of Kuwait—28 April. The UN Compensation Commission (UNCC), which settles the damage claims of those who suffered losses due to Iraq's 1990 invasion of Kuwait, today made \$880 million available to nine successful claimants, bringing the total amount of compensation disbursed to \$32.2 billion for more than 1.5 million successful claims of individuals, corporations, Governments and international organizations. The Commission was established in 1991 as a subsidiary organ of the UN Security Council. It has received nearly 3 million claims.

Non-communicable diseases leading cause of deaths worldwide, says UN report—27 April 2011. Health experts from around the world have convened in Moscow to tackle non-communicable diseases, which are the leading killer today and on the rise, according to a new report issued by the United Nations World Health Organization (WHO).

According to the first WHO Global Status Report on Non-communicable Diseases, 36.1 million people died in 2008 from conditions such as heart disease, strokes, chronic lung diseases, cancers and diabetes. Nearly 80 per cent of these deaths occurred in lowand middle-income countries.

"Chronic non-communicable diseases deliver a twopunch blow to development" says WHO Director-General Margaret Chan. "They cause billions of dollars in losses of national income and push millions of people below the poverty line, every year."

Cardiovascular diseases account for most deaths attributable to non-communicable diseases, claiming 17 million lives annually, followed by cancer, respiratory disease and diabetes. These four groups of diseases account for around 80% of all non-communicable diseases deaths, and share four common risk factors--tobacco use, inadequate physical activity, excessive alcohol, and poor diets.

Some 300 representatives are taking part in the Global Forum, which will provide inputs to the First Global Ministerial Conference on Healthy Lifestyles and Non-communicable Diseases Control.

Both events are a precursor to the first General Assembly high-level meeting on the prevention and control of non-communicable diseases, to be held in New York in September.

International Day of United Nations Peacekeepers

is a day to pay tribute to all who have served and continue to serve in UN peacekeeping operations. The date, May 29, marks the anniversary of the creation of the UN Truce Supervision Organization (UNTSO), in 1948 to monitor the ceasefire after the 1948 Arab-Israeli War.
